City Water Bill Payments are Due Upon Receipt

Bills can be paid online through the City's web site, in person at City Hall or placed in either drop box. Beginning on the 21st of each month, or on the Monday following that date if it falls on a weekend, a late charge of 10% is applied. If the past due amounts are not paid by the 25th of the same month at 8:00 AM, then vour water service will be discontinued on the 25th or the next business day if it is on a weekend or holiday. There is a reconnect fee of \$25.00 if your water is turned off for non-payment. If you have any questions, please contact City Hall at (417) 623-2027.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT

With storm season upon us I wanted to take a moment to inform everyone of the city's policies on warning sirens. Our sirens are for outdoor warning. If you are indoors you need to rely on television or a NOAA weather radio. The sirens will sound when a tornado warning is received for our portion of our county or surrounding counties or when winds speeds reach 70 MPH or higher. We will not issue an all clear.

The city residents have access to the storm shelter owned by the Joplin School District, located at 801 S Irwin. The fire station is not a shelter. If you go to the fire station you will be sent to the shelter at the school. The shelter will be opened when severe weather approaches our area. The school district has a policy that any animal in the shelter must be in a cage or carrier. This is for everyone's safety. If you have any questions or concerns, please let us know.

This article was originally published in the "Sarcoxie Record" on 6/16/1976. It is presented here in a 5 part section of this and upcoming newsletters. No changes have been made as to wording or phrases. We hope our readers enjoy this "Introduction to Duenweg."

PART 2

Wolves came in packs and killed the sheep and other small domestic animals. Wild cats and panthers came lurking around at night, so in every home the trusty rifle always remained loaded and ready for use. Everyone old enough to carry a gun was taught to shoot and learned to brave danger of all kinds.

Commissioners were appointed to select a permanent site of the seat of justice for the county. The bill provided that they should make their location as near the center of the inhabitable portion of the county as possible, without a survey, due regard being given to the situation. The commissioners chose the site and at a meeting of the county court held on March 28, 1842, the county seat was formally named Carthage.

The first session of Jasper county circuit court was held at the residence of Mr. George Hornback, the building measured 12 x 16 that besides a table contained half a dozen split bottom chairs and two old fashion beds. (This building still remains standing.)

A new court house was built in 1851. The new structure was a two story brick building, the lower used for the circuit court and other offices and the upstairs being set apart for county and jail purposes. This building served as a hospital for the wounded soldiers of both the Union and Confederate armies after the battle of Carthage, and in 1863 it was burned during one of the frequent raids that took place in the county.

Schools and churches began to be organize in the county. Samuel Teas was the first school teacher in the county, and the first church to be organized was the Centerville Presbyterian Church which carried on its work at the home of some good brother or at its annual camp meeting held at Sarcoxie Spring.

Saving Water as suggested by the EPA

Some of the following suggestions you may already be doing, some you may not have even thought of. Please take a minute to review then try the suggestions. You may very well see a difference in your water usage and with continued attention, a savings in your wallet.

There are lots of things you can do in your own home to reduce water use and get more for less. Just follow these simple tips to get started.

Fix a Leak:

Small household leaks can add up to gallons of lost water every day. Check your plumbing fixtures and irrigation systems routinely.

In the bathroom - where over half of all water use inside the home takes place:

- -Turn off the tap while shaving or brushing your teeth. This saves about 5 gallons per day.
- Showers use less water than baths, as long as you keep an eye on how long you've been lathering up.
- Toilets are notorious for leaking silently. City Hall has toilet tank leak detecting tablets available that you can use to check should you suspect a toilet leak.

In the kitchen - whip up a batch of big water savings:

- Plug up the sink or use a wash basin if washing dishes by hand.
- Use a dishwasher, and when you do, make sure it's fully loaded! Washing dishes by hand without the tap continually running saves about 25 gallons.
 - Scrape your plate instead of rinsing it before loading it into the dishwasher.
- Keep a pitcher of drinking water in the refrigerator instead of letting the faucet run until the water is cool.
- Thaw food in the refrigerator overnight rather than using a running tap of hot water.
 - Add food wastes to your compost pile instead of using the garbage disposal.

In the laundry room - where you can clean AND be green:

- Wash only full loads of laundry or use the appropriate water level or load size selection on the washing machine.
- To save money on your energy bills, set your washing machines to use cold water rather than hot or warm water.
